- **[American Red Cross – Los Angeles Region](#)**

The American Red Cross Los Angeles Region and partners are working tirelessly to support those affected by the Palisades fire. Red Cross LA has opened an emergency shelter providing shelter, food, water, health and emotional support services. The emergency shelter is located at the Westwood Recreation Center (1350 S. Sepulveda, Los Angeles, 90025). Domestic family pets are welcomed and must be in a travel carrier or pet crate. Large animals and livestock are welcome at Pierce College (6201 Winnetka Ave., Woodland Hills, CA 91371).

Recovery from natural disasters can span years, and communities can be left grappling with impacts long after media attention and initial funding has faded. Emergency response services are activated on short notice according to an agreed-upon notification procedure coordinated with federal, state and local governments. Typically, Salvation Army personnel and resources will congregate at predetermined staging areas, entering the impacted area only once government first-responders have indicated that it is safe and constructive to do so. These immediate response activities include food and hydration services, shelter, cleanup and emergency communication assistance to put victims in touch with their loved ones.
